## Health Tip of the Month: Alzheimer Disease (Lyn-Desert Rain)

Alzheimer disease is the most common form of dementia and the prevalence is on the rise. It affects 5.4 million people in the US, and that number is projected to reach 15 million by 2050. It is an incurable disease with a long and progressive course. In Alzheimer disease, plaques develop in the cerebral cortex and the hippocampus (a structure deep in the brain that encodes memories). Whether the plaques themselves cause AD or whether they are a byproduct of the AD process is still unknown.

factors for Alzheimer disease: Advancing age, Family history, Obesity, Hypertension, Traumatic brain injury.

Although there is no medicine or treatment that will prevent Alzheimer disease, there are now new drugs that can help slow (not reverse) the progress. The most common, Donepezil (Aricept) works by stoping the enzyme responsible for the destruction of acetylcholine, an important neurotransmitter. It would be good to discuss these new drug interventions with your doctor if you or loved ones notice early signs of AD. But the question is:

How do we pin down these early signs and could it be just the normal forgetfulness of aging?

A person with beginning AD will appear completely normal physically and mentally. The specific regions of the brain probably begin to be affected 10-20 years before any visible symptoms appear.

Signs of mild AD can include the following: Memory loss Confusion about the location of familiar places Taking longer to accomplish normal, daily tasks Trouble handling money or paying bills Compromised judgement, often leading to bad decisions Mood and personality changes; increased anxiety Loss of spontaneity and sense of initiative

Signs of moderate AD: Increasing memory loss and confusion Shortened attention span Problems recognizing friends and family members

Difficulty organizing thoughts, language, reading, working with numbers Inability to learn new things or cope with unexpected situations Restlessness, agitation, anxiety, tearfulness, wan-

## Sauerkraut & Sausage History (Mary–Vixen)

The first dates in the liberry books was 1997-1998, the books were kept by Nitro AKA Nyla Dossett. She kept the books until her sudden death on 1-15-2003, Slobber Jaws AKA Bob Dossett has been the bookkeeper since then.

The 1st trailer purchase was for \$400.00 in the 1997-1998 season. This liberry trailer was used for some books & lots of storage of tables, legs, coffeepots, speakers, etc.. In 1998-1999, there was another auction, the books record \$894.28 raised. On 2-16-2000. there is a notation for another auction. the total raised was \$1,653.00. The Airstream Trailer was purchased on 12-06-2001 for \$1,000.00. The 1st liberry trailer was sold on 12-17-2001 for \$400.00 which was the purchase price 4 yrs earlier. It was sold to Friendly Frog & Poliwog, who then sold it to Alberta

Rider, who then sold it to Angel & Redneck a year ago, who then sold it back to the liberry this year to use as a storage trailer freeing up the Airstream trailer to be used only as a liberry. All of the tables, legs, coffeepots, speakers, recycling barrels, etc., etc. are now being stored in this very "old" liberry storage trailer. So the 1st liberry has now completed the circle back to the newly remodeled Airstream liberry trailer. both to serve the community. There was also an auction on 1-11-2003, the total raised was \$1,414.50. The next auction was 2-22-2007, the total raised was \$1,711.47. The next auction was early in 2010, raising over \$1,500.00, all monies donated to Orb Weaver for the publication of our newsletters. The last auction was on 1-13-2015, the total raised was \$1,448.50. The liberry is now being

renovated, remodeled, rejuvenated, redone, & rehabbed. There are also funds from the "recycling" of plastics & aluminum cans, thank you everyone. So stop by & see the "NEW" Airstream liberry trailer.

The liberry funds are used for many community activities such as the needs of our Emergency Response Team, buying hams, turkeys, sauerkraut, sausage, etc. for our monthly potlucks, funding the printing of our monthly Boondocker Chatter newsletter, wood for our monthly dogburns, upkeep & maintenance on our liberry trailer & our storage trailer & other community minded projects.

The first sauerkraut purchase we could find in the liberry books was 2-16-2000. Over the last few years, we usually have the sauerkraut/sausage potluck on St. Patrick's Day. This year, will be our 15th zouerkraut feed with Slobberjaw's special recipe, on Tuesday, March 17th @ 1 PM @ the gravel pit ramada. Bring a chair, a drink, your table service, a hat & a potluck dish to share. There might be a special surprise this year.

dering, especially in late afternoon and night Hallucinations, delusions, paranoia, irritability, anger

Patients with severe AD cannot recognize loved ones and cannot communicate in any way. They are completely dependent on others for their care, and all sense of self seems to vanish.

They may be in bed much or all of the time. Death is often the result of other illnesses, often pneumonia.

The cause of Alzheimer disease is unknown. Investigators believe that converging environmental and genetic risk factors trigger a cascade that, over decades leads to AD. There are no proven methods for preventing AD, but research suggests that the following healthy lifestyles can reduce the risk:

Physical activity: stay active, exercise, create new pathways in the brain involving space, time and movement. Take up a new sport, learn a new dance, take a hike to a new area. Mental activity: challenge those brain cells with puzzles, learn new skills, a musical instrument, a new class, sing a new song, recite a new poem, read, write, create.

Cardiovascular fitness: (Yes, it always comes back to this)

1. Blood pressure for those over 60 without diabetes or

kidney disease should be below

140/90. Stop by the Christian Service Center Mondays 10 to 11 for a check.

 Cholesterol level total should be below 200.
Avoid obe-

sity/overweight. This is very difficult and we'll talk more about this later. 4. Eat a healthy diet centered on fruits, vegetables, and whole-grain foods. Include fish, nuts, beans and seeds. Restrict sugary foods, high salt and saturated fats.

Our chart at the Contact Station goes back to the 2001-2002 season. That year we had 750 on January 1st 2002. (We remember when there were over 2000 rigs in 1997-1998!) This year the count on Nov. 25th was 302; down from 307 in 2013-2014. The count in 2012-13 was 285 and 408 in 2011-12. The January 1st count this year was 419 which is down from 2012-13 season which was 462. On January 31st this year it was 506; 2013-2014 it was 500; 2012-2013 it was 542 and in 2011-2012 it was 640.

There are more figures at the Contact Station if anyone wants to see them. This just kind of touches the high spots so you can see how our numbers have mostly dropped.

## Camel Hunt Update (C.R.A.P. team)

On Friday, Feb 13th (please note the day & date), there were 2 cars that went out & took camel food, a bucket of water & a motion detector camera to the last sighting area, an all day trip. They returned on Friday evening, dreaming of camel recordings. On Tuesday, Feb 17th, the camel hunt camping trip was launched with SlobberJaws Bob, Grumpy Scott, Poodoo Raeann, Preacherman, Tinkerbelle, North Wind, Desert Rain, Bomber D, Lil Abner, McGyver & Plumbob. They returned on Thurs., Feb 19th, about 4 PM, knowing there were lots of camel questions awaiting them. And they were fully prepared with their "camel report" for inquiring minds. Thus the following report was given:

The team has returned from their 3 day/2 night camel expedition: The " Camel Reconnaissance Attribution Project": The pilot project is complete. Data analysis continuing. Primary objective verified. Folks gather at the Gravel Pit where a bunch of musically-challenged individuals have set up their guitars, banjos, amplifiers, keyboards, microphones, fiddles, ukuleles and various other toys. Hall and Johnny Cash, among others.

The Sunday music jam has murky origins and the lack of written documents forces us to rely on the memory of the few witnesses who are still around to attempt the reconstruction of a precise timeline. The writer therefore apologizes for any historical errors or omissions and would welcome any comequipment owned by the late A. B. Cooper from Wyoming (Toby Jack, from Washington, is still camp host at the Boat Ramp with his wife Sonny Gun). Back then, the Gravel Pit Ramada was roughly one-third of its present size.

The traditional Sunday music jam at the Gravel Pit was apparently born over thirty years ago when Toby Jack led the weekly event using sound jams, A. B. Cooper, then in his eighties, took over. Shortly thereafter, the BLM undertook construction work to expand and equip the Gravel Pit Ramada as we

know it today. The BLM also began issuing a seasonal permit to hold the weekly amplified music event. The permit remains a requirement to this day and must be applied for and renewed

took over the operation for several years.

In 2009, at Jim's request, the organization of the Sunday music jams was transferred to Landsailor, a regular jammer from Quebec who first came to the desert in 2006.

Today, the success of the event is due to the dedicated contribution of an entire team. The sound gear is provided by Nancy (New York) and Shirley (Alberta) who stay at Hidden Shores and who purchased the equipment from Jim. The gear is kept on Music Row in a storage trailer owned by Buster (Wisconsin) which in the off-season is stored free of charge at the Christian Center, compliments of the Preacher Man.

Each Sunday, the sound equipment is set up at the Gravel Pit by Shirley, Nancy, Buster and his son Randy (the bass-man from Iowa) with the kind help of Dusty Shoes and Landline. Maria (from Alaska, now living in the Foothills) kindly assists in ensuring the efficient and fair sequence of the jammers' performances. She also moves and adjusts the microphones as required before each song.

The writer, Landsailor, obtains the yearly permits and has the pleasure of overseeing the operation, providing guidance and coordination and « emceeing » the event each Sunday.

(A new tradition now appears to be gaining traction under the impulse of Vixen and the venerable Slobber Jaws. Roughly once a month, the jam is immediately followed by free root-beer and ice-cream floats!)

### Update on Idaho Flattop–Ken Kinder & Idaho Curly Top–Ida Kinder


